Our transportation services in rural Yellowstone County and in Billings allow seniors without alternative transportation to access healthcare, shopping, the Billings' meal sites and other destinations that are critical to living an independent life.

The Resource Center connects individuals and their families and caregivers with local services and assists with Medicare, Medicaid and Social Security along with offering caregiver support.

Message from the Board Chairman

Chairing the Board of Directors of the Yellowstone County Council on Aging this past year has been an honor and a joy. Yellowstone County's seniors and their families are well-served by a staff committed to providing a wide range of programs and services to meet their needs.

After four moves in ten years, YCCOA purchased a permanent home at 1505 Avenue D. Not having to move again, board and staff could now redirect their focus on programs, services and fundraising activities. With extensive public involvement, a three-year strategic plan was adopted that defines challenges and opportunities along with the strategies,

goals and objectives to address them. New mission and vision statements were also created. YCCOA began working with a marketing firm to increase visibility, promote programs and services and establish a consistent brand. This is a work in progress, but exciting changes are forthcoming.

Organizational sustainability continues to be the most significant challenge facing our organization. The senior population in Yellowstone County is exploding and their needs are ever-increasing with the fragile economy. At the same time, federal and state funding has been reduced, county

mill levy funds are being reserved due to property tax protests and there is increased competition among nonprofits for fewer dollars from grants and donors.

Our annual *September Evenings* fundraising event was successful and it continues to grow. The "Firecracker BBQ" generated modest revenues and much PR value with many city and county officials and policy makers serving the public a picnic dinner. Our one-time and core donors provide much-needed financial support.

While the challenges are substantial, the YCCOA has provided exceptional service to our communities in Yellowstone County for over 35 years. The staff and board members are dedicated to ensuring that the organization continues to meet the needs of seniors for many years to come.

Nutrition

The cost of a one-year supply of home-delivered meals = approximately one day in the hospital.

Adequate nutrition is essential for healthy aging and the prevention or delay of chronic diseases and disease-related disabilities.

The Council on Aging provides a well-balanced midday meal through two programs, the Senior Dinner Program and the Meals on Wheels Program. These programs enhance the quality of life by providing nutritious meals, personal contact and related services.

- **Senior Dinner Program**

The Senior Dinner Program brings seniors together at eleven senior centers and meal sites throughout Yellowstone County. In conjunction with a nutritious meal, the centers and sites offer education, entertainment and companionship.

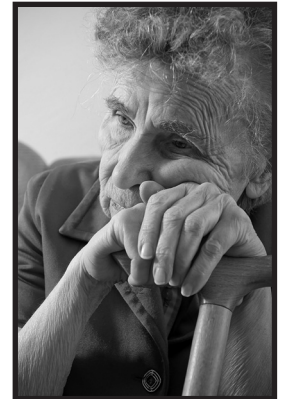
- **Meals on Wheels Program**

The Meals on Wheels Program provides a nutritious midday meal Monday through Friday in Billings, Lockwood, Laurel and the Worden area. The program helps alleviate the food insecurity and loneliness experienced by seniors who want to stay in their own homes but cannot prepare a meal.

Mary is a caregiver by nature. The comfort of her family, friends and guests always takes priority. But after devoting 35 years to her job and her husband, Mary now struggles alone with pain from arthritis and the effects of a heart attack.

That is why the Council on Aging is there to make sure that Mary doesn't go a day without food or companionship.



Transportation

When people no longer drive and family members can't drive them, community-based transportation services may be their only hope of being able to get where they need to go.

Adequate transportation is important to the well-being of older adults. Individuals who can no longer drive and who do not have alternative transportation may experience malnutrition, isolation and inadequate medical care, all primary risk factors for premature institutionalization.

The Council on Aging, through the provision of five different transportation programs, aims to help seniors overcome their limitations, increase their level of mobility and provide them with the ability to access desired destinations. These programs are important for individuals who cannot use more traditional means of public transportation and lack more informal sources of transportation.

Billings Transportation Services

- **Meal Site Cab Program**

The Council on Aging provides rides to five meal sites through local cab companies. To be eligible for the service, the senior is required to eat lunch at the meal site.

- **Medical Cab Program**

Seniors who need a ride to a medical appointment and who can ride comfortably in a cab may access medical appointments through the Medical Cab Program.

- **RIDES Program**

The RIDES Program provides non-medical and non-emergency rides for seniors with no alternative transportation. To



use this program, a senior must be able to transfer into a private vehicle with minimal assistance. Volunteer drivers, who are certified through the Council on Aging, use their own vehicles to provide rides.

- **MET Special Transit**

The Council on Aging contracts with Billings MET Special Transit to provide a limited number of medical rides each day for seniors who use mobility aids such as a wheelchair. Individuals wishing to use this program must first be certified through MET Transit.

Transportation

Rural Transportation Services

- **Laurel Transportation**

The Council on Aging and the City of Laurel have partnered to provide transportation to Laurel residents. Service is provided Monday through Friday from 10:00 to 4:00 and to/from Billings the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of each month, dependent upon demand. Any type of trip is eligible.



- **Eastern Yellowstone County**

Transportation is provided from Custer to/from Billings the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays of the month for any type of trip. Residents of Ballentine, Huntley, Worden and Shepherd may also ride the bus with advanced notice.

The Laurel bus is a lifeline for me. I like to go grocery shopping twice a month. I also need to get to medical appointments. Since I can no longer drive, I would be lost without the bus.

My disabled son and I live in Custer. When my husband passed away, I wanted to move closer to Billings, but housing is just too expensive. Both my son and I have chronic health problems. Without the Custer bus, we couldn't get to our medical appointments.

Information and Assistance

Accessing services and programs that assist older adults may be confusing. They and their caregivers often need guidance in finding the information and programs that meet their individual needs.

The Council on Aging's Information and Assistance services (I&A) are often the initial point of contact for individuals seeking information about available services. I&A offers a variety of accurate and up-to-date information, assistance and referral services to help seniors work through the maze of available long-term care options.

- **The Resource Center**

The Resource Center serves as a trusted place where seniors, adults with physical disabilities, their families and caregivers can turn for information on the full range of long-term support options as well as assistance in accessing those options.

- **Caregiver Support Program**

The Caregiver Support Program provides information, support, and resources to people who need help caring for a family member, friend, or neighbor.



- **Whom Do You Ask?**

This directory is a comprehensive resource that helps guide seniors, their families and friends through the maze of senior-related programs.

- **Senior News**

The *Senior News*, provided at no cost, is the only monthly publication in Yellowstone County dedicated solely to seniors, caregivers and their families.

Lynn's dad has dementia, which is becoming progressively worse. Lynn's mom, who has been his caregiver, has just been hospitalized due to cancer and will no longer be able to care for him. Lynn didn't know where to turn. The Resource Center has been helping Lynn address the needs of her parents as well as her needs as a caregiver.

Volunteering

Not only does volunteering benefit the community; senior volunteers experience fewer physical limitations and less decline in health due to aging.

- **RSVP**

The Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) assists individuals 55 and older find volunteer service opportunities in their communities. RSVP volunteers serve from one to several hours a week assisting seniors to live independently, mentoring at-risk youth and in public health, public safety and disaster preparedness.

Often, a major life change will cause an RSVP volunteer to stop volunteering. The RSVP staff, knowing how important it is to a person's health to keep active, particularly during major life changes, keep a close watch on their volunteers.

Carole, who had been active for years, suddenly stopped volunteering after a major change in her life. The RSVP Volunteer Coordinator could no longer connect with Carole as her phone had been disconnected. Through research, a new address was found and after receiving a letter from RSVP, Carole called the RSVP office immediately. Carole once again started volunteering at her favorite organizations and even started attending a meal site and participating in other activities. Reconnecting with RSVP was just the spark that Carole and other seniors facing similar situations need to once again start living an active and fulfilling life.

Housing

Safe and secure housing helps seniors remain independent.

- **Minor Home Repair Program**

As people age, so do many of their homes and the need for even minor home repairs can become a threat to the homeowner's health and safety.

Low-income homeowners 62 and older are assisted with safety related minor repairs, such as installing a grab bar by the tub or fixing the front steps.

- **Fair Housing**

The Resource Center provides information on fair housing rights and assists seniors who feel that they are being discriminated against when seeking housing.

Social Opportunities

Equally as important as good nutrition in maintaining the health of seniors is regular socialization with others.

Socialization plays a large role in maintaining quality of life as one ages. Older adults who have strong social networks seem to have a higher quality of life, live longer and are healthier compared to those with little social support. Socializing also seems to protect against cognitive decline and self-reported disability.

- **Trips**

A variety of trips are offered throughout the year, including day trips and longer trips within Montana and surrounding states. Trip-related expenses are totally covered by trip participants.

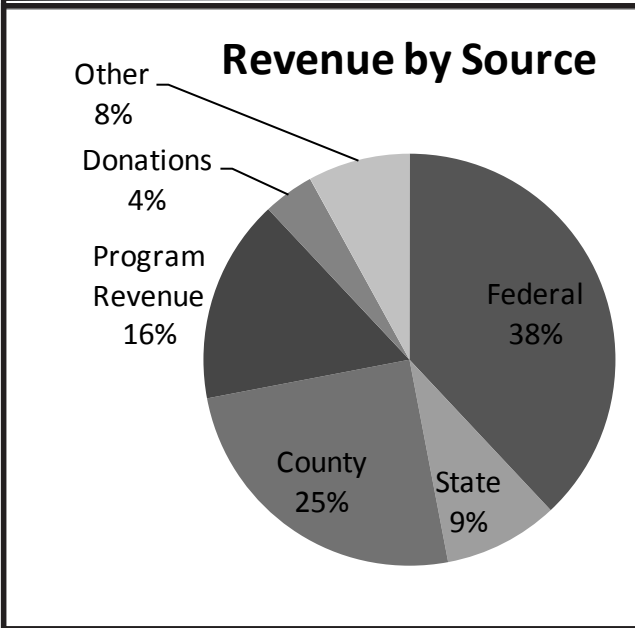
Number of Trips.....6 (169 participants)

- **Senior Centers**

Six senior centers in Yellowstone County provide opportunities for seniors wanting to get out and become involved. In addition to a noon meal provided through the Council on Aging's Senior Dinner Program, the centers provide medical screenings, activities, education and opportunities to spend time with friends and make new friends.



Funding



Federal – Includes the Older Americans Act, Department of Agriculture and the Corporation for National and Community Service.

State- Allocated to transportation and in-home services.

County – Two mils support senior programs and services countywide.

Program Revenue – Donations received by program participants.

Donations - Includes proceeds from an annual event, *September Evenings*, direct mail and private donations.

Other – Includes special grants, trips and *Senior News* advertising revenue.

*The Council on Aging Board of Directors has been given the responsibility of allocating senior mill levy funds by the Yellowstone County Commissioners. In FY 10-11, the Yellowstone County Council on Aging received \$750,171 from two mills. A total of \$245,819 or 33% of the senior mill levy funds were passed directly on to senior centers and other senior agencies. Of the remaining funds, 56% were allocated to the Council on Aging for direct services and 9% for administration, repairs and the annual audit.

Brief Organizational History

1975.....The Yellowstone County Council on Aging was formed by County resolution. A seven-member council was appointed by the County Commissioners to serve as a coordinating body for senior programs within Yellowstone County.

1977-1978.....The Yellowstone County Council on Aging was staffed by a part-time director and seven staff. Programs were expanded to include:

- Nutrition - Senior Dinner and Meals on Wheels Programs;
- Socialization - Six senior centers opened;
- RSVP - Transferred from the Human Resources Development Council (HRDC);
- The Minor Home Repair Program;
- Home Health Care - contracted with City-County Health Department and Senior Helping Hands.

1978-1998.....YCCOA focused on program and service expansion.

- Senior Dinner Program - Expanded to five meal sites;
- Transportation - Took over the operation of the Laurel Transportation Program;
- Custer, Laurel and Broadview Senior Centers - Assisted with the acquisition of the facilities and funding;
- 1983 - Moved into the Billings Community Center.

1998..... Voters approved a one-mil levy for senior services.

1999.... Moved from the Billings Community Center to 1501 14th Street West.

2004..... The Resource Center was established through a federal grant. The Council on Aging moved to 1309 16th St. W.

2006..... Voters approved a second senior mill levy.

2007 - 2009..... Meal sites were established at the Shepherd Feedlot and in Lockwood at the Harvest Church.

2008..... Moved to temporary offices at West Park Plaza.

2009..... Moved for the last time to 1505 Avenue D, which was made possible by a generous bequest by Blanche Vavra.

2010.....New commercial kitchen at 1505 Avenue D prepared its first meal for the Billings Senior Dinner and Meals on Wheels Programs. A new meal site was also opened at this location, replacing the First Presbyterian meal site. A deli menu was added to the menu options.

Looking Ahead

FY 2010 - FY 2013 Strategic Plan

Adopted October 27, 2010.

To reflect the challenges and opportunities facing the Council on Aging, five “big questions” were formulated. It was determined through the planning process that the organization must address each of these questions in order to fulfill its mission.

How will the Council on Aging address the needs of a changing and growing senior population?

Q. 2

How can the Council on Aging increase the public’s knowledge about its programs and services?

Q. 3

How can the Council on Aging, through partnerships, further its mission, develop resources, strengthen its programs and thrive in the competitive world?

Q. 4

How can the Council on Aging ensure its sustainability?

Q. 5

How can the Council on Aging reduce its dependence on governmental funding and diversify and increase its revenue base to ensure that future program needs can be financed?

Plan Implementation

Progress reports are presented to the Board of Directors at the end of every quarter to ensure that the implementation of the goals and objectives are on track. An overall evaluation and update of the plan will be conducted during early 2013
